USING A COMPOST TUMBLER

I have been composting for more than 30 years. Recently a rat persisted in chewing holes through my black plastic compost bins. After much research and various attempts to resolve the problem, I decided to switch to a rodent-proof compost tumbler, the Jora JK 270. I AM THRILLED WITH MY NEW COMPOST TUMBLER! Although my new compost tumbler was expensive, I LOVE its design and I LOVE how easy it is to load and unload; and to rotate. No more pitch fork! No more waiting months for rich compost to amend my vegetable garden soil! My new Jora tumbler has 2 separate chambers with large openings. I can add organic materials to one side of the compartment, while allowing the leaves and vegetable scraps on the other side to mature. In my kitchen I have a sink-top cutting board with a large hole in it. Underneath that hole I keep a gallon bucket to collect compostable scraps. NO SMELL! Because my new compost tumbler is fully insulated and completely sealed, it heats up *amazingly* fast to create compost in record time. The brochure says two weeks NOT the months it takes in a traditional bin.

Why should people compost? When you reuse and recycle your own organic waste, landfill sites do not fill up as quickly. Composting is a natural process, so you do not use any fossil fuels or other forms of energy to create it. Furthermore, once the compost is ready, you can use it to enhance your soil and fertilize your ornamental and edible plants.
