History of Hopkins Wilderness Park

The hillside of today's Hopkins Wilderness Park was originally used as a lookout place by the Chowinga Indians. The Chowinga village at Malaga Cove had been inhabited for at least 7,100 years. At the site of today's AES power plant in Redondo Beach there were wetlands and a saltlake. These wetlands were a source of food (halibut, lobster, sea bass) and salt for the local Chowinga Indians. Centuries passed.

During the Cold War from 1956 to 1963, unnamed Hopkins Wilderness Park was Nike Missile Site LA-57. Nike sites throughout the U. S. were designed as the last line of defense against possible Soviet bombers.

In 1977 Hopkins Wilderness Park was named for Francis E. Hopkins. Hopkins had served as Redondo Beach city manager from 1954 to-1972 and led the effort to acquire the land. In 1977 the city remade the former missile site into a wooded pocket park. The park includes 11 acres of hills, paths, trees and a pond.

Today from the hill on the western edge of the park, you can still see over Redondo Beach to the sea, just like the Chowinga Indians could centuries ago.

RESTORATION GOALS for Wilderness Park

South Bay Parkland Conservancy has joined with R B City staff, youth organizations, and community members to complete over 200 work hours of clean up and restoration to the lower pond area. Below are the **GOALS.**

- 1. Restore the lower pond
- 2. Enhance native habitat throughout park
- 3. Create community & botanical gardens
- 4. Create more opportunity for community engagement
- 5. Create vital, productive, and functional landscapes within the park

HOLLYWOOD RIVIERA MARKERS

Hollywood Riviera will be officially identified by two markers. The Hollywood Riviera marker project began in 2012 by the "Friends of the Hollywood Riviera". Planning and design of the markers have been completed. Torrance City Council gave its approval on Dec. 7, 2017.

Marker 1 will be placed at the original 1928 entrance to the Hollywood Riviera at the corner of Monte D'Oro and Palos Verdes Blvd. It will be a smaller than planned (14 feet long by 5 feet high) "break-away" structure for safety reasons.

"HOLLYWOOD RIVIERA" will be on the front. Our community's historical details will be on the back. The front uses a font that is a close replica of the one used in original promotional materials for the neighborhood. Below are the artist's conceptions of the front and back:



The rear of the marker will document a brief history of the Riviera and will be set using custom/period tiles.



The entire text above reads:

The Hollywood Riviera was established by developer Clifford F. Reid in 1928. Inspired by the beauty of its seaside location and surrounding hills, he coined the name due to his familiarity with the French Riviera and to attract residents from the movie industry. Sales initially boomed but were soon constrained, first by the Great Depression in 1929 and later by World War II. By 1941, only 42 Mediterranean style, red-tile roof homes and one apartment house had been built. Ultimately, it was the aerospace industry rather than Hollywood that contributed to the neighborhood's growth. The postwar housing boom in 1945 spurred new construction and the original Mediterranean architectural restrictions were abandoned. Hollywood Riviera's borders expanded over time and came to include approximately 3,100 homes.

Marker 2 will be at the intersection of Palos Verdes Blvd. and PCH. This vintage stone marker at the boundary of Torrance and Redondo Beach will be renamed. The wording will change from *just* TORRANCE to HOLLYWOOD RIVIERA, TORRANCE.
