She mixed the concrete in a wheelbarrow, and then lined the boxes with plastic greased with Vaseline before pouring in the concrete. Decorative elements are added later. Mary showed us examples of earlier work. Forty two watched in rapt attention.

Landscape of the Month Award

January - The Ganalon Family

At **4910 Calle de Arboles** is a brand new garden that beautifully enhances one of the most stunning remodels in the Riviera. This landscape was designed and installed by Scott Martin of Scott Martin Designs. It has a curving border laid out on a gentle slope to accent the Mediterranean style of the home. A handsome flagstone entry path is flanked by a variety of plantings, such as *dodonaea purpurea*, kangaroo paws, *loropetalum*, *salvia*, golden diosma, *lavendula*, *heuchera*, daylilies, and rosemary. An olive tree, 3 crape myrtles, a prunus and many fruit trees provide a graceful architectural balance as they meander across the slope.

December - The Antongiorgi Family

At **547 Calle Mayor** This new landscape, conceived by landscape architect Brian Ackerman and installed by Martinez Bros., was born out of a need to repair drainage issues, as well as provide some private space, buffer the home from a busy street and add curb appeal. The result is a handsome combination of earth toned concrete pads and steps and a mini forest of mature and stately trees with an under story of shrubs, grasses and groundcover. The main trees are birch, white crape myrtle and deciduous western red bud, which will be a blaze of bronze and maroon when leafed out. Other plants when blooming in spring

will be white Indian hawthorn, white agapanthus, chartreuse euphorbia, Japanese blood grass, pennisetum fountain grass, heuchera “coral bells” and myoporum ground cover.

November - Barney Little

At 328 Avenida Atezada Perched above a busy street with incredible views, this garden showcases an exuberant planting of 'Richmondensis' Begonia, Lobelia, Potato Vine, Canna and Mexican Sage which provides lively color most of the year with enough evergreen leaf structure in between. Lots and lots of color was the owner's main request and Pedro Gutierrez (310-200-1146) has provided it. He removed 1 foot of original soil and replaced it with premium top soil and Gro-Mulch, which provides rich nutrients. As a result very little fertilizer is required and the plants are thriving. All gardeners should take note of this highly recommended procedure. The key to a healthy garden is the quality of the soil.

It's surprising to learn that our RGC Treasurer became an octogenarian in October. June Young became a member of the Rivera Garden Club after a neighbor invited her to a meeting. June had just retired from Hughes Aircraft where she had been an executive secretary. At the time, Jean Levanas was president of the club and June went on to

become president herself later.

Born in Taft, California, a “hot, boring oil town,” June thought she was in heaven when her family moved to Burbank – she loved the milder weather and all the activities available so close to hand. She was a “Sinatraphile,” loved the theatre (especially musicals), dancing and most music, including opera. Madam Butterfly is her favorite.

Organized, always immaculately dressed with coordinated jewelry she most likely designed herself, it's amazing to learn that petite June was crew for her energetic sailor husband Ray, now

deceased. Besides her love of the ocean, she is an avid collector of cranberry glass, crystal lamps, and jewelry and porcelain dolls. June loves to knit plus designs and sews all her own clothing.

June met her husband-to-be at a singles dance at the old Roosevelt Hotel ballroom in Hollywood. Their connection was a love of music. They also both enjoyed dancing and took lessons for many years. Ray was an R & D Engineer at Hughes Aircraft. June said he could do anything and did. He remodeled their upper Riviera home all by himself. He did a wonderful job, adding a second story and constructing both floors like the prow of a ship to take advantage of the sweeping views. Ray also designed and installed a beautiful stained glass window reclaimed from a church as a dining room window in their home.

The piano is June's love. Classically trained, June won a contest at age 17 to play with the Burbank Symphony Orchestra. She taught piano for many years and was also a pianist for the “Notables,” a chorale music group formed by Hughes employees, for 24 years. She still plays daily in her living room on her beautiful, 100 year-old Knabe grand piano.

June has two grown children, a boy and girl, who both live locally. She is delighted that both her grandchildren have inherited her joy of music, and are majoring in music at Cal State University.

June grows and cares for over 50 roses in her well-maintained garden. Her favorite rose is the coral-colored Gemini.
