CHILDREN'S GARDEN PLAN

Danielle Brown, Development Officer of the **South Coast Botanic Garden, (SCBG)** gave a talk and slide show about the proposed **Children's Garden** to the members of the RGC at the September 25 Welcome Back Potluck. Danielle explained how successfully rebuilding the new Rose Garden last year helped the creators of the future Children's Garden to foresee any potential needs in completing that new children's project.

A brief history of the Botanic Garden: The SCBG was built on an old diatomaceous earth mine. By 1956 production of the mine declined and the site was sold to the County of Los Angeles. From the very beginning, L.A. County planned to utilize their best technological ideas to reclaim the land for future use. However, until that happened, the site was used as a sanitary landfill or *garbage dump* to help meet the county's growing landfill needs. In 1961, private citizens, headed by **Frances Young**, successfully prevailed upon the County Board of Supervisors to convert this site into a botanic garden. As the garbage underneath those 10 feet of soil atop the landfill decomposed, the area underneath became extremely **HOT** and the land buckled unevenly while toxic methane gas was created. No permanent structures or utilities could initially be installed over the composting garbage. Experiments were undertaken to determine which trees or shrubs could survive with such a hostile environment 10 feet beneath their roots. Now over 57 years later major expansion is planned for the South Coast Botanic Garden. **Danielle Brown** explained that the Children's Garden will be completed in 3-5 years **IF** the SCBG Foundation can raise the needed 7 million dollars. Children and interested adults were asked what characteristics this proposed children's garden should have. Respondents indicated that the garden should be **FUN**, have areas for active unstructured play, and be **MAGICAL**. Requirements listed by some were that the garden should also be **EDUCATIONAL**, a **PLACE TO TOUCH NATURE**, and that the garden should be **SAFE** with ample **SHADE** throughout. There should be places for kids to get dirty if they

wish and there should be places to have **birthday parties** as well as space for **school groups** to enjoy short programs.

Danielle showed us "napkin drawings" and architectural sketches of future features in the planned 3 ½ acre garden. We saw the **sunflower maze** utilizing sunflowers and children to create a human sundial to calculate the time. We saw huge **entrance pillars** that showed the cores of the diverse earth beneath the Botanic Garden. We saw photos of joyful children playing on a future **grassy slope** where they could either roll down or run in the grass. Danielle indicated there will be a "**pollinator pathway**" with plants and fruit trees that would attract birds, bees and butterflies at one of the two entrances to the garden. There would be a **fossil dig** space as well as an **edible garden** where children can be actively involved **digging, planting or harvesting**. This children's garden will be designed so that ALL children will be able to enjoy it, not just those who are ambulatory. As Danielle Brown explained to us, visitors will "feel the sense of adventure" when they enter the children's garden. "It will be a place like no other!" This author believes RGC and local community members are excitedly anticipating the opening of this wonderful children's garden. The children in our families will surely enjoy unique adventures and learning experiences when this "*magical*" garden is completed inside the SCBG!
